MakerSpace Basics

- Located at the Main Library
- Opened in January 2015
- A place where people can have access to technology and equipment they would not otherwise have access to



We are here to help!

- Staff members will show you how to use the equipment
- Staff members will advise you on the best way to make your project happen
- You are the maker, we are the space
 - Staff will not design projects for you!



18 Stations

- Variety of equipment for all ages and skill levels
- Appointments/reservations can be made for most equipment
 - Book ahead for popular things like vinyl printer & laser engraver
- There are time limits – between 2 and 4 hours, depending on the equipment

Button Makers

- Make buttons or magnets in 3 different sizes, 3 inch, 2.25 inch, or 1.5 inch
- You can also make 1.5 inch keychains
- Design your own or use one of our templates and download photos from the internet, a phone, or flash drive



Paper Crafts

- Paper!
 - We have a limited supply of extra paper – bring your own to ensure the colors/quantities you would like!
- Crayons, markers, colored pencils, scissors, paper cutters
- Ellison machine & die cuts
- Laminator (8½ x 11 and 11 x 17)
 - 50 cents per page



Cricut Maker 3 & Epson P900

- Cut stencils, decals, shapes and letters
- Epson printer for high quality prints on paper of sizes from 4" by 6" up to 17" by 22"
- Tricky machine and difficult software – but staff will help you!



Digital Creation Stations

- PCs with lots of great software
- Full Adobe Creative Suite
 - Photoshop, Illustrator, Premiere Pro, Audition, Dreamweaver, etc.



Media Conversion Station

- Convert old media (VHS, vinyl records, cassette tapes, photos, slides, negatives, 8mm film, super 8 film, and documents) into digital content
- 100% free!
- Conversion is done in real time
 - 90 minute VHS = 90 minutes to convert to digital



Vinyl Printer/Cutter

- Really big printer!
 - 54 inch wide media, 52 inch printable area
- Different types of media to print on:
 - Outdoor banner vinyl
 - Glossy paper
 - White or clear adhesive
 - White removable adhesive
 - White or clear static cling



Laser Cutter/Engraver

- Etch/engrave on a variety of materials
 - Wood
 - Glass
 - Stone/marble/granite
 - Leather



Laser Cutter/Engraver

- Cut a variety of materials
 - Wood
 - Acrylic
 - Leather



Sewing Machines

- What do you need?
 - The MakerSpace supplies machines and sewing kits (needles, scissors, feet for machine, pins, etc.)
 - You supply the material



UV Printer

- Prints using ink & UV light
 - 24x18 inch printable area
- Prints on flat surfaces including:
 - Metal
 - Glass
 - Wood
 - Plastic
 - Virtually any flat surface (except fabric)



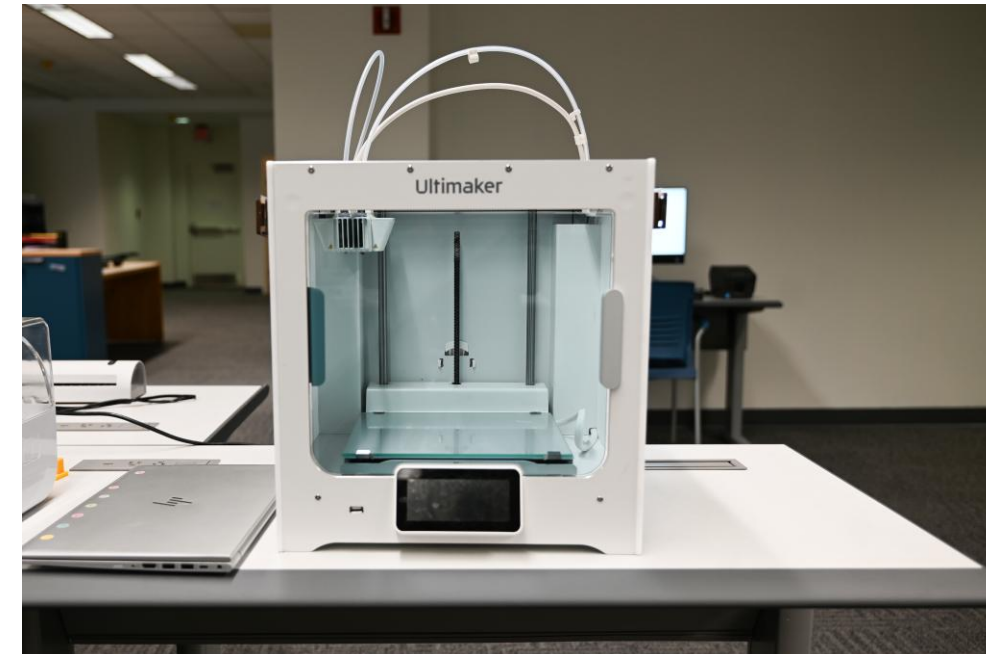
Sublimation Printer & Heat Press

- Prints paper that transfer ink to a variety of surfaces.
- Heat press used to transfer ink to surfaces like Fabric or plastics.
 - T-shirts (Sublimation ink interacts best with synthetic material; 100% polyester is recommended for t-shirts)
 - Mouse- pads
 - Mugs



3D Printers

- How do they work?
 - Plastic (or *filament*) is loaded into the machine through a tube until it reaches a hot point (*extruder*)
 - Plastic is heated up to 215 degrees Celsius (419 degrees Fahrenheit)
 - Extruder works like a hot glue gun, slowly moving back and forth building an object layer by layer



Recording Booth

- How does it work?
 - Record yourself singing, playing a musical instrument, doing a podcast or interview, or just talking
 - When you are done, edit your tracks and save them to a CD, flash drive, or upload them to the internet



Photography Printer

- SureLab D1070 printer for high quality prints on paper up to 8 inches wide.



Video/Photography Area

- How does it work?
 - We have a green screen set up most of the time – we also have white and black backdrops that can be switched out
 - You can check out a camera from us for use in the MakerSpace or bring your own camera/phone



Espresso Book Machine

- Option 1: Printing on demand books
 - Visit www.ondemandbooks.com and choose a book from their catalog (mostly older, copyright free books)



Espresso Book Machine

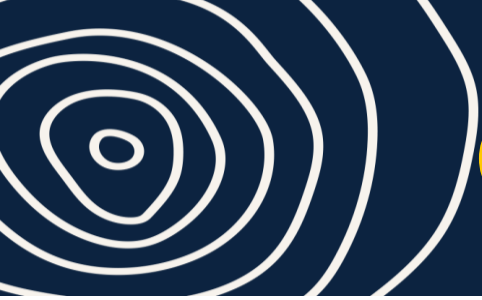
- Option 2: Self publish your own book!
 - Meet with a staff member to go over your book design
 - \$2.50 for the cover and 5 cents a page



Large-Format Scanner

- Enables hi-quality scans of large media to get good digitized versions
 - 26 x 46 inch surface to scan
 - Scanned object can be 8 inches thick and up to 22 pounds
 - Can scan at 1200 dpi

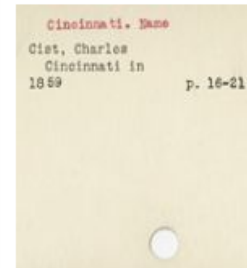

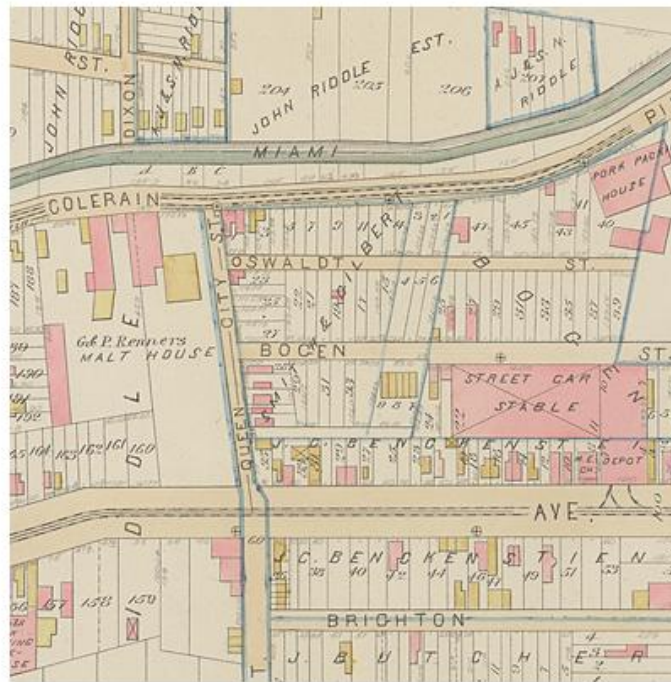


Audubon's Viviparous Quadrupeds of North America



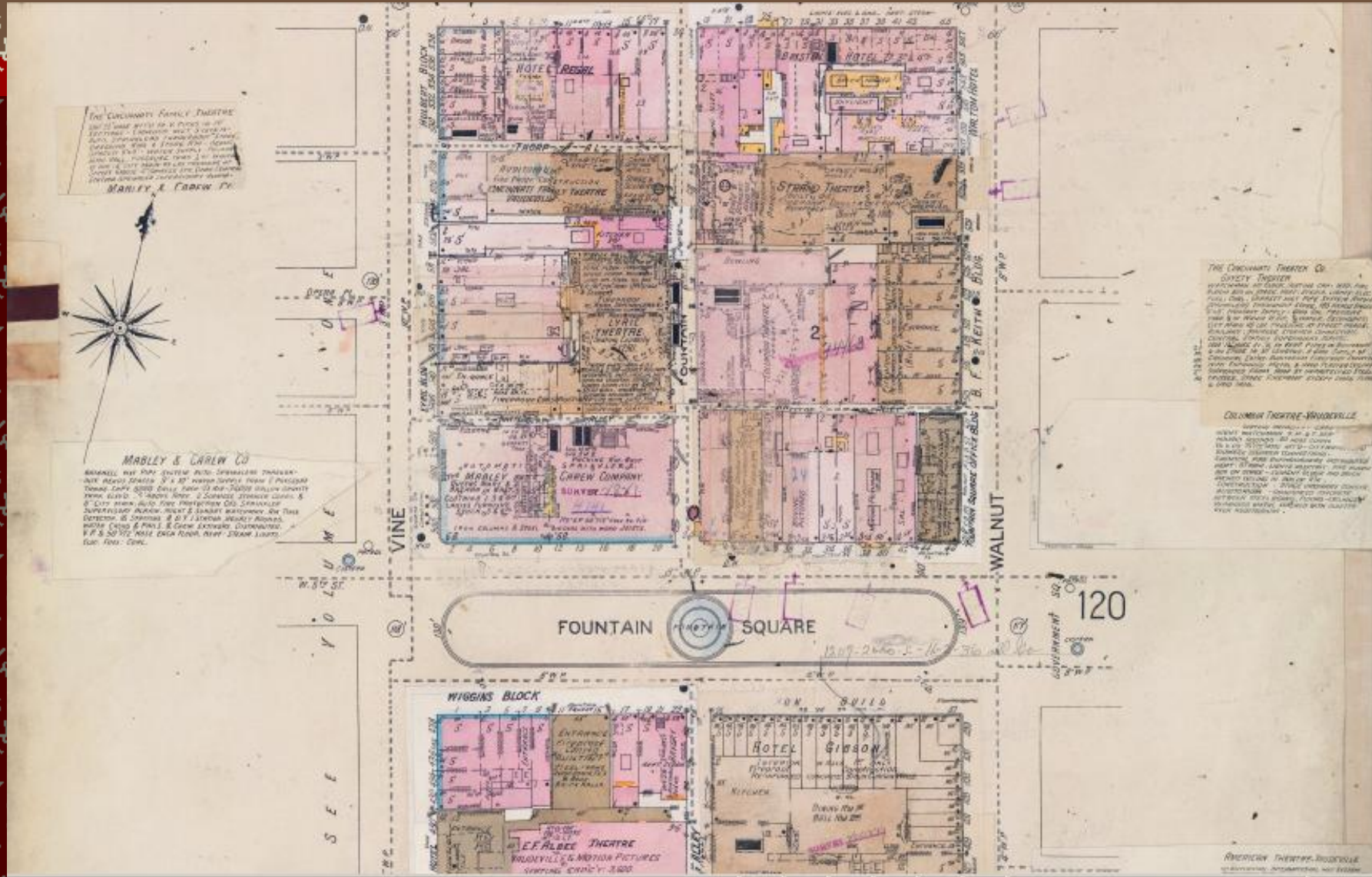
Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps

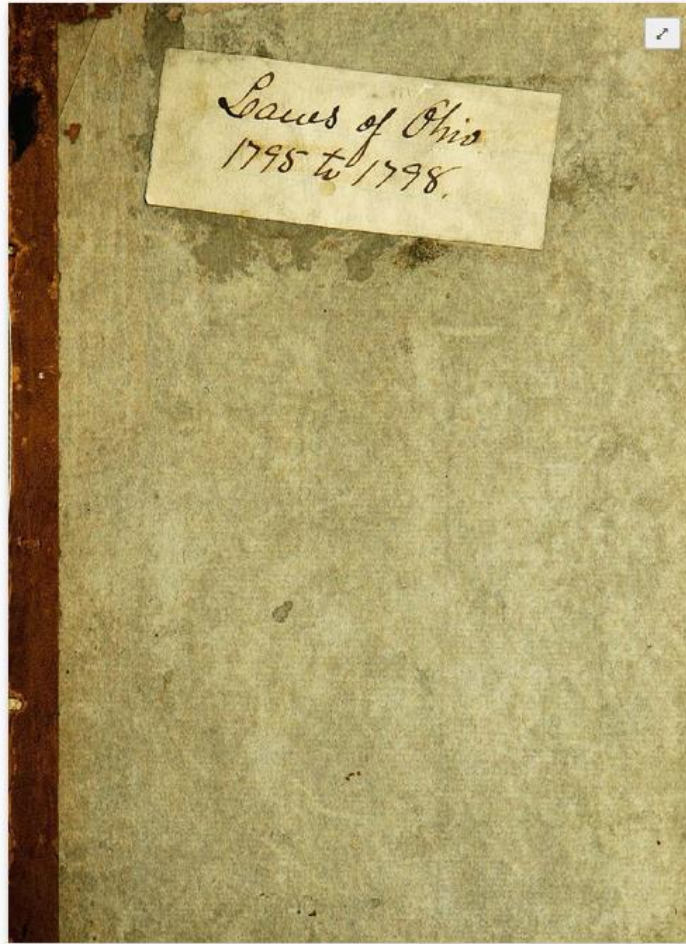

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF
THE TERRITORY OF THE UNITED STATES, NORTH-
WEST OF THE RIVER OHIO.

BE IT ORDAINED by the United States in Congress assembled, that the said territory, for the purposes of temporary government, be one district; subject, however, to be divided into two districts, as future circumstances may, in the opinion of Congress, make it expedient.

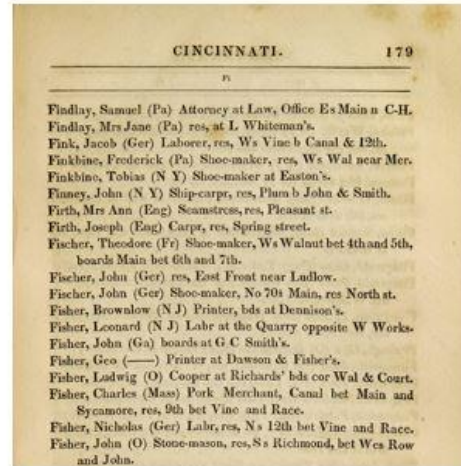
N. W. Territory to be one district, but subject to become two.

Be it ordained by the authority aforesaid, that the estates both of resident and non-resident proprietors in the said territory, dying intestate, shall descend to, and be distributed among their children, and the descendants of a deceased child in equal parts; the descendants of a deceased child or grand-child, to take the share of their deceased parent in equal parts among them; and where there shall be no children or descendants, then in equal parts to the next of kin, in equal degree; and among collaterals, the children of a deceased

How intestates' estates, real and personal, shall descend.

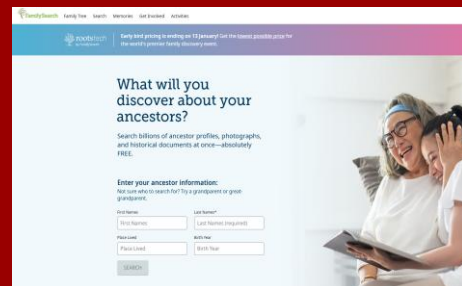
