
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Bad News & Good News


Bad news

- Since 2016, our on-campus voter registration and voting rates have plummeted
 - In 2016, 3121 individuals were registered to vote in precinct 12-B, and 1846 voted (59.1% voting rate)
 - In 2023, only 550 individuals were registered to vote in precinct 12-B, and only 25 of them voted (4.55% voting rate)
 - Precinct 12-B had the lowest voting rate out of all precincts in Hamilton County in 2023
- Between 2016 and 2020, the youth voter turnout in Ohio increased by 5%, from 44% in 2016 to 49% in 2020
- As a result, we would have expected a 5% increase in turnout between 2016 and 2020—but instead we saw a 41.1% decrease in turnout



Good news

- Our overall voter registration and voting rates are much higher
 - Data from TurboVote suggests that we had a 58% voter registration rate and a 53% voter turnout rate among eligible voters in 2022
 - The median voter registration rate for colleges in 2022 was ~69%, and the median turnout rate was ~55%
- The Hamilton County Board of Elections said that they will consider redrawing the precinct lines for 12-B to include our on-campus housing facilities located in 12-C and 12-E!



We need you!

- All of us have the responsibility to ensure that our students are registered to vote and educated on how to vote
- UC Votes alone cannot ensure that all 51,000 students are able to vote
- It takes a village!



1: Check Voter Registration Status

- Encourage students to visit uc.turbovote.org to look up their voter registration statuses

- Many students will mistakenly assume that they were registered to vote in high school
- Students could have be purged from voter rolls if they skipped elections





2: Register to Vote

- Students from all states can register to vote online using their home address via uc.turbovote.org
- In order to do so, they will likely need the last four digits of their social security number or their state ID number
- They can only register to vote online in Ohio if they have an Ohio state ID or driver's license
- If your student doesn't have an Ohio ID, they will need to register to vote using a paper voter registration card

How do you prefer to register?

To register using the Kentucky online voter registration system, you are required to provide your full Social Security number. If you don't have a Social Security number, you can still submit a voter registration application by mail or in person.



- Do not fill in the form for them/ do not edit the form for them
- If you collect the form from them, it must be turned in to their county's Board of Elections within 10 days
- Students should use blue or black ink
- Instruct students to check a box next to "I am", next to #1, and #2
- If the student is a first-time voter, they will fill out numbers 3-11, and 14
- They will fill out 12 and 13 only if they were previously registered to vote in Ohio

 - A: They can complete it if they will be 18 by November 5
- Q: Is there a deadline to turn in a voter registration card?
 - A: Voter registration cards must be turned in by October 7

Identification Requirements

If you have a current Ohio driver's license or state ID card, you must provide that number on line 10. If you do not have an Ohio driver's license or state ID card, you must provide the last four digits of your Social Security number on line 10. If you have neither, please write "Non-I".

Residency Requirements

Your voting residence is the location that you concided to be a persimenent, not a temporary residence. Register to vote: Campus address

- Students can register to vote with a campus address if they presently intend to return to the university following a significant break like winter break or summer break
- The student gets to decide where they would like to register to vote; you cannot tell them where to register to vote
- Again, students must fill out a paper voter registration card to register to vote with a campus address
- Campus addresses can be found on the UC Votes website or using the QR code to the right

3: Choose Voting Methods & Voter ID

- There are 3 voting methods in Ohio:
 - Method #1: Voting early in-person
 - Could be useful for students who don't plan on having time to vote in-person on Election Day
 - Students must provide a valid form of ID in order to vote early in-person
 - Early voting in Ohio begins on October 8 county Boards of Elections



Hamilton County Board of Elections

- There are 3 voting methods in Ohio:
 - Method #2: Voting by mail
 - Could be useful for students who don't have access to a valid state of Ohio ID or a passport because it only requires you to document the last 4 digits of your social
 - Students should complete, print and sign the absentee ballot application (top QR code to the right) and return it by mail or in-person to their county's Board of Elections
 - If the student lives on campus, refer them to the "voting addresses for campus housing facilities" page to identify the mailing address for their absentee ballot application (bottom QR code to the right)

Voting addresses for campus housing facilities

- There are 3 voting methods in Ohio:
 - Method #2: Voting by mail
 - Applications must be received by their county's Board of Elections by October 29; you may provide them a stamp for their application
 - Waiting until October 29 to turn in your application is not advised, as voted ballots MUST be received by their county's Board of Elections by November 9
 - Once they receive their absentee ballot in the mail, they must fill it out and put the correct number of stamps on their absentee ballot envelope; one stamp per page of ballot; stamps can be purchased at the UC Bookstore or at the Corryville Post Office
 - You cannot provide them stamps for their voted absentee ballots

 – this is illegal
 - Absentee ballots are due to county Boards of Elections by November 9

Voting addresses for campus housing facilities

- When filling out the application, the student should use blue or black ink
- They can't request an absentee ballot for a primary election and the general election using the same form
- Do not fill this out for the student, and do not tell them what to write down
- Required aspects are highlighted; tell them to follow the numbers
- Make sure they write down their county and not USA in question #3
- Make sure they provide a form of identification for question #6 and that they check the November General Election box for question 7
- Encourage them to provide contact information in case something is wrong with the form
- Encourage them to sign up the be a poll worker

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- There are 3 voting methods in Ohio:
 - Method #3: In-person on Election Day
 - Could be useful for students who have enough time to vote in-person on Election Day and for those who have a valid form of voter ID
 - Polls are open in Ohio from 6:30AM- 7:30PM; note that Election Day is a reading day at UC, so there are no classes on Election Day
 - Students should check their voter registration status so they can find their polling location; you can confirm your voter registration information using TurboVote (top QR code) and you can confirm your polling location using Vote.org (bottom QR code)
 - Note that you can sign up for election reminders via TurboVote
 - Tell students to bring anything they might need while they wait in line (water, snacks)

- There are 3 voting methods in Ohio:
 - Method #3: In-person on Election Day
 - Tell them that if they are in line to vote at 7:30PM, they should NOT leave the line!
 - Let them know that if the poll workers are unable to find their voter registration information, they have a constitutional right to a provision ballot; provisional ballots will be counted if the Board of Elections verifies their OH state ID number or the last 4 digits of their social security number, which must happen by the 4th day after the election
 - Tell students to put the Election Protection Hotline in their phones: 1-866-OUR-VOTE
 - The Greater Cincinnati Voter Collaborative is providing free rides to the polls on Election Day (and for early in-person voting)

3: Voter ID

- Students will need to bring their voter identification if they vote early in-person or if they vote in-person on Election Day
- The following are the only acceptable voter IDs in Ohio:
 - Unexpired Ohio driver's license: commercial, motorcycle, probationary, interim, temporary, or restricted
 - Unexpired Ohio issued ID card-- will be issued by the state for free**
 - US military ID card
 - Ohio issued National Guard ID card
 - US issued Department of Veterans Affairs ID card
 - Unexpired US passport or passport card





3: Voter ID

- The address on the voter ID does not need to match the voter's registration address
- The Ohio BMV will issue State of Ohio ID Cards for FREE to anyone 17 or older who does not have a driver's license; this is important for students who wish to register to vote using an on-campus address
 - Out of state students who are registered to vote in Ohio who get a free Ohio ID will have their home state license revoked
 - Out of state students who register to vote in Ohio can vote by mail with the last 4 digits of their social or in-person with a passport
 - VoteRiders, a nonpartisan nonprofit, will help anyone get a free ID


